Implementation Update

SUPERVISION AND REINVESTMENT POLICIES

Focus supervision on high-risk offenders

Earned discharge from parole

- Awarded starting July, 2013
- FY 14 – 3,203 parolees (78.4%) of total (4,085) received EDC and these 3,203 represent (85.6%) of parolees eligible (3,495)
- FY 15 through April, 2,806 parolees (76.5%) of total (3,669) received EDC and these 2,806 represent 85.8% of parolees eligible (3,149).
- FY 14 and FY 15 to date: 1,343,592 days awarded and 1,695 offenders released with EDC.

SUPERVISION AND REINVESTMENT POLICIES

Improve the supervision of parolees

- a. Enhance supervision through Evidence-Based Practices
 - **EPICS/Core Correctional Practices**
 - **Train the Trainer – with UJS – Completed**
 - **Training parole agents**
 - **1 group completed**
 - **1 group trained – doing recordings**
 - **1 group scheduled for training in July**
- b. Strengthen risk and needs assessments used by parole
 - **Validate Community Risk Assessment**
 - **Norm and validate LSI-R**
 - **Completed**
- c. Improve outcomes through housing option for CTP offenders
 - **Pilot program with St. Francis House in Sioux Falls**
 - **28 current participants (22 M and 6 F); 66 participants to date**

SUPERVISION AND REINVESTMENT POLICIES

Specialized programs and services to improve outcomes

Community supervision pilot program tailored for Tribal Communities

- Sisseton-Wahpeton Oyate – 41 participants – current – 61 to date
- Standing Rock

EFFICIENCY & SUSTAINABILITY POLICIES

Improve training on evidence-based practices

a. Provide Parole Board

- Annual Board training
 - During Board week
 - NIC – Chairs and New Members Training
- New Board member training within 60 days of appointment
- Use of risk assessments and evidence-based practices
- FY 14 – 100% of Board members received required training

b. Require training for parole agents

- Criminal risk factors
- Targets to reduce recidivism
- Content of annual and new agent training includes EBP
- EPICS
- FY 14 – 100% of Agents received required training


EFFICIENCY & SUSTAINABILITY POLICIES

Improve efficiency and accessibility of systems

Reinvestment fund for local jurisdictions


- Counties incur jail, monitoring and transportation expense to retain additional offenders in community
- \$1,000 - \$1,200 for each additional probationer
- **First payment 10/2014 based on FY 14 end of year count**
\$314,600 to counties based on increases in # on felony probation.

PROGRESS HIGHLIGHTS

1. Prison population is flat and a bit below projected impact of the PSIA
2. Number of SD parolees is down by about 200
3. Successful completions of parole are up: 37% in FY 12; 45% in FY 13 and 60% in FY 14.
4. Parole violation admissions to prison are down.
There were 702 admits due to parole violation in FY 14
Based on trends through April it is estimated that that there will be 497 admissions for PV in FY 15
5. Recidivism is down.
